In the Margins of the 81st Session of the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA81), the Journalists and Writers Foundation will host the 11th Annual SDGs Conference 2026 in New York on Wednesday, 23 September 2026, in New York. This event is organized in collaboration with 56 civil society organizations from 30 countries.

Over the past decade, the Journalists and Writers Foundation and its global partners have proudly convened this multidisciplinary platform, creating an international community that unites hundreds of high-level UN diplomats, Heads of State, civil society leaders, human rights advocates, journalists, and youth leaders worldwide. The 3 Days of Actions includes the JWF High-Level Reception, the SDGs Roundtable Discussions, SDGs Conference, and the Pioneers in SDGs Awards. These initiatives aim to promote action-oriented and inclusive policy proposals to accelerate the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) while addressing complex issues and responding to emerging threats to international peace and security.



PANEL 1: RENEWING MULTILATERAL SYSTEMS FOR A NEW GLOBAL FRAMEWORK

The international landscape is at a pivotal juncture, requiring a comprehensive revitalization of multilateral institutions to confront today's challenges in line with universal human rights and international law. As global power dynamics and financial structures evolve, the UN 2.0 initiative seeks to reform core UN functions through a coordinated framework aimed at enhancing efficiency, transparency, and accountability. This reform comes at a critical moment, as the UN prepares to elect its next Secretary-General, emphasizing greater openness and inclusivity to rebuild trust in multilateral leadership.



Amid pervasive global challenges—such as rising authoritarianism, shrinking civic freedoms, cybersecurity threats, misinformation, and societal polarization—geopolitical shifts are undermining democratic institutions. Reshaping multilateralism in this context demands collective efforts to strengthen governance, uphold shared values, and adapt systems to new technological and geopolitical realities. Enhanced international collaboration and alignment of priorities are essential to reinforcing rules-based global governance, human rights, gender equality, and multilateral cooperation, especially as public confidence in international institutions wanes. Fostering a shared sense of purpose and the principle of “leaving no one behind” has become more vital than ever.

Panel Session 1 will explore how reforms can create a more resilient, inclusive, and effective multilateral system capable of responding to today’s contested global environment and empowering future generations. It will identify factors contributing to fragmentation and propose inclusive policy actions to shape a renewed multilateral architecture suited for the future.

PANEL 2: BRIDGING DIVIDES: STRENGTHENING CIVIC TRUST AND REBUILDING SHARED VALUES

Political polarization is no longer simply a domestic challenge; it has become a global obstacle to sustainable development. When societies lose the capacity to engage differences constructively, trust in institutions erodes, social cohesion weakens, and collective action becomes increasingly difficult. In this environment, progress toward the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)—particularly those related to peace, justice, strong institutions, and inclusive societies—faces significant headwinds.

Yet polarization is not inevitable. Around the world, citizens, civil society organizations, faith communities, and public leaders are developing practical approaches to restoring trust, strengthening civic relationships, and fostering a renewed sense of shared purpose. This panel will explore how societies can bridge deepening divides and cultivate the habits of listening, humility, and collaboration necessary for democratic resilience and sustainable development. Special attention will be given to community-based depolarization efforts that equip ordinary citizens to engage across political, ideological, religious, and cultural differences.

PANEL 3: PRESS FREEDOM AND INDEPENDENT JOURNALISM AS A CROSS-CUTTING ENABLER OF PEACE

In today's increasingly interconnected and digital world, press freedom and independent journalism serve as essential pillars that promote positive peace, support sustainable development, and facilitate conflict resolution. However, the rapidly evolving information ecosystem poses significant challenges. Content journalism on social media platforms has expanded faster channels for information dissemination, but has also further facilitated the spread of disinformation, misinformation, and hate speech, diminishing public trust and the integrity of the information environment. Protecting journalistic integrity in this landscape requires robust safeguards, legal protections, and ethical standards to ensure truthful reporting and the safety of journalists.

At the same time, journalists face mounting threats beyond misinformation. Transnational repression, digital attacks—including cyber harassment, surveillance, and targeted disinformation campaigns—are increasingly used to intimidate or silence media workers, particularly those exposing human rights abuses or challenging authoritarian regimes. These threats weaken press independence and threaten social cohesion and peace. Women journalists have faced particular brutality, with a global surge in violence targeting them, shaped by regional risks and cultural contexts. Gender-based violence, harassment, and threats hinder their participation and ability to report on critical issues, leading to a rise in self-censorship. Addressing these challenges requires gender-responsive strategies that promote safety, equality, and empowerment within the media sector.

Moreover, concerns about artificial intelligence and automated content creation threaten to undermine public trust in media institutions. As AI-driven disinformation and deepfake technology become more sophisticated, combating these issues demands renewed efforts to enhance media literacy, transparency, and accountability.

Young people, as both digital natives and active participants in societal change, are uniquely positioned to shape and influence the future of digitalization. Engaging youth voices in discussions around AI and digital governance is essential to ensure that technological advancements promote social good, uphold democratic values, and protect human rights. This youth panel aims to provide a platform for young leaders and innovators to share insights, experiences, and innovative solutions related to AI and digitalization. The session will focus on empowering youth participation in governance, exploring AI's role in addressing societal challenges, and fostering responsible digital citizenship.

- **Youth and Digital Tools for Peacebuilding:** Discussing the role of digital platforms and social media in mobilizing youth for peacebuilding efforts; exploring strategies that amplify youth voices in conflict prevention and reconciliation processes.
